The Board of the Office of Congressional Ethics (the "Board"), by a vote of no less than four members, on May 31, 2013, adopted the following report and ordered it to be transmitted to the Committee on Ethics of the United States House of Representatives.

SUBJECT: Representative Peter Roskam

NATURE OF THE ALLEGED VIOLATION: In October 2011, Representative Peter Roskam and his wife visited Taiwan on an officially connected trip. According to the travel disclosure forms filed by Representative Roskam, the sponsor of the trip was the Chinese Culture University, an educational institution founded in 1962, located in Taipei, Taiwan. However, the trip appears to have been organized and conducted by the government of Taiwan, with little to no involvement by the University.

If Representative Peter Roskam accepted payment of travel expenses for an officially connected trip to Taiwan from an impermissible source, resulting in an impermissible gift, then he may have violated federal law and House rules.

RECOMMENDATION: The OCE Board recommends that the Committee on Ethics further review the allegation, as there is substantial reason to believe that Representative Roskam accepted payment of travel expenses for an officially connected trip to Taiwan from an impermissible source, resulting in an impermissible gift, in violation of federal law and House rules.

#### FINDINGS OF FACT AND CITATIONS TO LAW

Review No. 13-9784

On May 31, 2013, the Board of the Office of Congressional Ethics (the "Board") adopted the following findings of fact and accompanying citations to laws, regulations, rules, and standards of conduct (in italics).

The Board notes that these findings do not constitute a determination of whether or not a violation actually occurred.

#### I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. In October 2011, Representative Peter Roskam and his wife visited Taiwan on an officially connected trip.
- 2. According to the travel disclosure forms filed by Representative Roskam, the sponsor of the trip was the Chinese Culture University, an educational institution founded in 1962, located in Taipei, Taiwan.
- 3. However, the trip appears to have been organized and conducted by the government of Taiwan, with little to no involvement by the University.

#### A. Summary of Allegations

- 4. Representative Peter Roskam may have violated federal law and House rules by accepting payment of travel expenses for an officially connected trip to Taiwan from an impermissible source, resulting in an impermissible gift.
- 5. The Board recommends that the Committee on Ethics further review the allegation, as there is substantial reason to believe that Representative Roskam accepted payment of travel expenses for an officially connected trip to Taiwan from an impermissible source, resulting in an impermissible gift, in violation of federal law and House rules.

#### B. Jurisdictional Statement

6. The allegations that were the subject of this review concern Representative Peter Roskam, a Member of the United States House of Representatives from the 6th District of Illinois. The Resolution the United States House of Representatives adopted creating the Office of Congressional Ethics directs that, "[n]o review shall be undertaken...by the board of any alleged violation that occurred before the date of adoption of this resolution." The House adopted this Resolution on March 11, 2008. Because the

#### C. Procedural History

- 7. The OCE received a written request for a preliminary review in this matter signed by at least two members of the Board on January 25, 2013. The preliminary review commenced on January 26, 2013. The preliminary review was scheduled to end on February 24, 2013.
- 8. At least three members of the Board voted to initiate a second-phase review in this matter on February 22, 2013. The second-phase review commenced on February 25, 2013. The second-phase review was scheduled to end on April 10, 2013.
- 9. The Board voted to extend the second-phase review by an additional period of fourteen days on March 22, 2013. The additional period ended on April 24, 2013.
- 10. Pursuant to Rule 9(B) of the OCE Rules for the Conduct of Investigations, Representative Roskam presented a statement to the Board on May 31, 2013.
- 11. The Board voted to refer the matter to the Committee on Ethics for further review and adopted these findings on May 31, 2013.
- 12. The report and its findings in this matter were transmitted to the Committee on Ethics on June 13, 2013.

#### D. Summary of Investigative Activity

- 13. The OCE requested and received testimonial and, in some cases, documentary information from the following sources:
  - (1) Representative Peter Roskam; and
  - (2) Representative Roskam's Executive Assistant.
- 14. The Chinese Culture University declined to provide documentary or testimonial information in response to a Request for Information and was determined to be a noncooperating witness. The University provided a statement in response to the Request for Information, which is discussed below.
- 15. The OCE also requested documentary and testimonial evidence from the Taipei Economic and Cultural Representative Office in the United States ("TECRO"). TECRO declined to provide documents or to make officials available for interviews.

# II. REPRESENTATIVE ROSKAM MAY HAVE ACCEPTED PAYMENT OF TRAVEL EXPENSES FOR AN OFFICIALLY CONNECTED TRIP TO TAIWAN FROM AN IMPERMISSIBLE SOURCE, RESULTING IN AN IMPERMISSIBLE GIFT, IN VIOLATION OF FEDERAL LAW AND HOUSE RULES

#### A. Laws, Regulations, Rules, and Standards of Conduct

#### 16. United States Constitution, Article I, Section 9, Clause 8

"No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States: and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them, shall, without the consent of the Congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince, or foreign state."

#### 17. Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act

"Congress consents to the acceptance by a Federal employee of grants and other forms of assistance provided by a foreign government to facilitate the participation of such Federal employee in a cultural exchange...but the Congress does not consent to the acceptance by any Federal employee of any portion of any such grant or other form of assistance which provides assistance with respect to any expenses incurred by or for any member of the family or household of such Federal employee."

#### 18. House Rules

House Rule 23, clause 1 states that "[a] Member . . . of the House shall conduct himself at all times in a manner that shall reflect creditably on the House."

House Rule 23, clause 2 states that "[a] Member . . . of the House shall adhere to the spirit and the letter of the Rules of the House and to the rules of duly constituted committees thereof."

House Rule 23, clause 4 states that "[a] Member . . . of the House may not accept gifts except as provided by clause 5 of rule XXV."

#### 19. House Ethics Manual

"[T]he Constitution prohibits federal government officials from accepting any gift from a foreign government without the consent of Congress, and Congress has consented to the acceptance of certain gifts from foreign governments – including travel in limited circumstances – in two enactments: the Foreign Gifts and Decorations Act ('FGDA') and the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act ('MECEA'), A Member, officer, or

employee may accept travel expenses from a unit of foreign government only under one of these two statutory grants of authority."5

"Under MECEA . . . the traveling Member or employee may not accept travel expenses for a spouse or family member."

"The rule requires that a private entity (or entities) that pays for officially-connected travel will organize and conduct the trip, rather than merely pay for a trip that is in fact organized and conducted by another entity,"

20. House Travel Guidelines and Regulations

"Expenses may only be accepted from an entity or entities that have a significant role in organizing and conducting a trip, and that also have a clear and defined organizational interest in the purpose of the trip or location being visited. Expenses may not be accepted from a source that has merely donated monetary or in-kind support to the trip but does not have a significant role in organizing or conducting the trip."8

21. Committee on Standards of Official Conduct Report on the Investigation into Officially Connected Travel of House Members to Attend the Carib News Foundation Multi-National Business Conference in 2007 and 2008

"To be permissible, a private source must both organize and conduct the trip, rather than merely pay for a trip that is in fact organized and conducted by someone else."

- B. Representative Roskam Could Not Have Accepted Payment of Travel Expenses for His Trip to Taiwan from Either the Government of Taiwan or the Chinese **Culture University**
- 22. From October 15 to 22, 2011, Representative Peter Roskam and his wife visited Taiwan on an officially connected trip. 10
- 23. According to the travel disclosure forms that Representative Roskam filed with the Committee on Ethics, the sponsor of the trip was the Chinese Culture University, 11 an educational institution founded in 1962, located in Taipei, Taiwan. 12

- 24. While the Chinese Culture University was identified as the sole sponsor of Representative Roskam's trip to Taiwan, information obtained by the OCE during the course of its review indicates that the trip was actually organized and conducted by the government of Taiwan.
  - 1. The government of Taiwan was not a permissible sponsor of Representative Roskam's trip to Taiwan, as the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act ("MECEA") did not apply to his trip
- 25. Representative Roskam had been invited to travel to Taiwan by TECRO officials numerous times since he was elected to the House of Representatives. <sup>13</sup>
- 26. TECRO is the government of Taiwan's principal representative in the United States, serving as Taiwan's *de facto* embassy. <sup>14</sup>
- 27. The invitation for the trip that is the subject of this referral came from TECRO in May 2011, when TECRO official Gordon Yang sent an email to Representative Roskam's Executive Assistant, inviting Representative Roskam and other Members of Congress "to join the congressional delegation to visit Taiwan," as authorized by MECEA, in June or July 2011. 15

How are you? I hope this email finds you all well.

I would like to invite your Congressman or Congresswoman to join the congressional delegation to visit Taiwan during the period either from June 25 to July 2 or the period from July 16 to 23. The specific dates of travel are subject to change to accommodate the individual Member's schedule.

The trip is authorized under the State Department's Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchanges Act(MECEA) and sponsored by the Government of Taiwan. It also follows the most updated ethic rules of both the Senate and the Mouse.

The delegation will be composed of 10-12 House Members and their staff. Each Member can bring one staffer along. The itineray will be arranged to address the Members' interests, providing them with the opportunity to understand more about Taiwan while enhancing the bilateral relations between their respective constituencies and Taiwan.

Please let me know if your boss can attend the CoDel at your early convenience, hopefully by Tuesday. May 31. Please also feel free to contact me (information as below) if you have any question about the trip. I look forward to hearing from you soon. Thank you!

- 28. Representative Roskam could not recall when he first learned about this invitation to travel to Taiwan, or any specific conversation about the invitation. 16 He said that he likely was told that he had received an invitation to travel to Taiwan and given a proposed itinerary.<sup>17</sup>
- 29. Representative Roskam did not recall any discussion about the sponsor of the proposed trip. 18 He told the OCE that he "has come to understand that there were two proposed sponsors" for his trip to Taiwan, whom he identified as the government of Taiwan and the Chinese Culture University. He did not recall any specific conversations about the distinction between the two sponsors. He did not recall any discussion about whether the proposed trip would be planned under MECEA or privately sponsored.<sup>21</sup>
- 30. Representative Roskam said that he did not have a sense of who was paying for the trip. and did not recall if that issue was discussed.<sup>22</sup> Rather, he said that his office relied on Ethics Committee approval of the trip.<sup>23</sup>
- 31. Representative Roskam ultimately decided to travel to Taiwan with his wife, but he could not recall when this decision was made.<sup>24</sup>
- 32. As indicated in the invitation email from Mr. Yang, the Taiwan trip was initially to be organized and paid for by the government of Taiwan under MECEA.<sup>25</sup>
- 33. Representative Roskam's Executive Assistant said that, at some point after receiving the invitation from TECRO, Representative Roskam told him that he wanted to take his wife with him on the trip to Taiwan. <sup>26</sup> This prompted the Executive Assistant to have a conversation with Mr. Yang. <sup>27</sup> He could not recall when this conversation took place. <sup>28</sup>
- 34. According to the Executive Assistant, as a result of this conversation with Mr. Yang, it was determined that Representative Roskam's trip would not be conducted under MECEA, but would be privately sponsored instead.<sup>29</sup>
- 35. The Executive Assistant believes he would have discussed with Mr. Yang the need for a private sponsor for the trip, but he did not recall if he knew who the private sponsor was at the time of this conversation.<sup>30</sup>

- 36. Because Representative Roskam's wife traveled with him to Taiwan, the trip could not have been conducted under MECEA. Representative Roskam therefore could not have accepted payment of travel expenses from the government of Taiwan.<sup>31</sup>
  - 2. <u>Because Representative Roskam's trip to Taiwan was organized and conducted by the government of Taiwan, not the Chinese Culture University, the University was not a permissible sponsor of the trip</u>
- 37. Representative Roskam, through his Executive Assistant, formally accepted TECRO's invitation to travel to Taiwan on June 7, 2011.<sup>32</sup> At the time, the trip was scheduled for July 2011.<sup>33</sup>
- 38. According to Representative Roskam, the purpose of the trip was to learn more about the relationship between the United States and Taiwan.<sup>34</sup>
- 39. Representative Roskam said that his congressional staff, primarily his Executive Assistant, was involved in planning the trip. 35 He did not recall any specific discussions about the trip, but did recall some general discussion of the proposed itinerary, mostly about the timing of the trip and his interest in seeing his daughter while in Taiwan. 36
- 40. Representative Roskam told the OCE that he assumed that his staff was working with the House Ethics Committee and "those submitting the invitation" while planning the trip. <sup>37</sup> When asked who he meant by "those submitting the invitation," Representative Roskam said that was the Chinese Culture University and the government of Taiwan. <sup>38</sup>
- 41. Representative Roskam said that he had a "high level of confidence" that his staff was regularly checking with the House Ethics Committee while planning the trip. <sup>39</sup>
- 42. On June 7, 2011, Mr. Yang sent a tentative itinerary to Representative Roskam's Executive Assistant. 40 Mr. Yang advised the Executive Assistant that he "will work with

Taipei and get all the paperwork for you asap.... Please let me know if Mr. and Mrs. Roskam want to add or take out any event...."41

- 43. The Executive Assistant did not know to whom Mr. Yang was referring when speaking of "Taipei," nor did he recall focusing on that reference. 42
- 44. Representative Roskam's Executive Assistant first learned that the Chinese Culture University would be the private sponsor of Representative Roskam's trip to Taiwan when he read that in the tentative itinerary sent to him by Mr. Yang. 43

- 45. The Executive Assistant said that he did not know who prepared the tentative itinerary. 44
- 46. At the time he received the tentative itinerary, the Executive Assistant was not familiar with the Chinese Culture University. He did not have any conversations with Mr. Yang about who the Chinese Culture University was. 46
- 47. While the Chinese Culture University was identified as the private sponsor of Representative Roskam's trip, the travel arrangements and itinerary continued to be organized and planned by Taiwanese government officials.
- 48. On June 15, 2011, Mr. Yang emailed the Executive Assistant that he had "all the documnets [sic] for you to file to the ethics committee." He later emailed that he "will bring the invitation and private sponsor certification form signed by the Chinese Culture University" to the Executive Assistant's office. 48
- 49. The Executive Assistant told the OCE that, while he understood at this time that the Chinese Culture University was the private sponsor of Representative Roskam's trip,

- Subject to the Nondisclosure Provisions of H. Res. 895 of the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress as Amended neither he nor anyone in his office had had any contact with the University. 49 He did not discuss the private sponsor certification form with anyone from the University. 50
- 50. On July 11, 2011, Representative Roskam, his wife, and the Executive Assistant had a "pre-trip lunch" with the TECRO Representative in the United States, during which they discussed the Roskams' coming trip to Taiwan.<sup>51</sup>
- 51. Around this same time, changes in the congressional schedule necessitated a change in travel dates for Representative Roskam. <sup>52</sup> On July 20, 2011, the Executive Assistant emailed Mr. Yang with new travel dates of September 24 to 30, 2011. <sup>53</sup>
- 52. The Executive Assistant told the OCE that he did not discuss scheduling with anyone from the Chinese Culture University. 54
- 53. TECRO officials were responsible for making the logistical arrangements for Representative Roskam's trip. For example, on June 6, 2011, the Executive Assistant had asked Mr. Yang if the proposed date of departure could be moved by one day. Mr. Yang responded that he would "change flights booking at once." Mr.
- 54. On July 28, 2011, Mr. Yang emailed the Executive Assistant to inform him that he had "book[ed] the flight from San Francisco to Taipei in early morning (around 1 am) on September 24th. That means that Mr. and Mrs. Roskam need to flight [sic] out from DC or Chicago to San Francisco in the evening of the 23rd. Do you think if it would work for their schedule? Let me know." 57
- 55. Mr. Yang was also included in emails from China Airlines to the Executive Assistant regarding the flight arrangements for Representative Roskam and his wife. 58
- 56. The Executive Assistant told the OCE that the only person he spoke with regarding the logistics for Representative Roskam's trip was Mr. Yang.<sup>59</sup>

- 57. On August 3, 2011, Mr. Yang emailed an updated tentative itinerary, with travel scheduled for September 23 to 30, 2011, to the Executive Assistant, asking him to "[1]et me know if there's any question on your end."
- 58. On August 4, 2011, the Executive Assistant emailed Mr. Yang to request another change in travel dates to avoid the potential for conflicts with congressional business. Mr. Yang responded the next day, telling the Executive Assistant, "For now, I will contact travel agent to book flights for the new dates and give Taipei a heads-up that the Congressman might change the dates of his visit."
- 59. When the Executive Assistant emailed Mr. Yang on August 22, 2011, to confirm the new dates for the trip, Mr. Yang responded, "I'm now in Taiwan and have told our guys here about the change of dates. They understand Mr. Roskam's concern and would change everything based on the new dates October 15-21. I will get back to you with the new ethics form from the sponsor sometime next week."
- 60. The Executive Assistant told the OCE that he did not know to whom Mr. Yang was referring when he spoke of "our guys." 64
- 61. On August 26, 2011, Mr. Yang emailed another updated tentative itinerary, with new travel dates of October 15 to 22, 2011, to the Executive Assistant. 65
- .62. On September 2, 2011, Mr. Yang emailed the Executive Assistant to let him know that he "got the new ethics form from the Chinese Culture University. I plan to stop by your office on Tuesday to deliver it to you...." The invitation letter from the Chinese Culture University to Representative Roskam included in Representative Roskam's travel filings is dated September 2, 2011. 67
- 63. The Executive Assistant said that, on or around September 15, 2011, Representative Roskam asked him to get in contact with the people organizing the Taiwan trip to arrange time for him to visit his daughter while he was in Taiwan.<sup>68</sup>
- 64. On September 15, 2011, Representative Roskam's Executive Assistant emailed Mr. Yang to request that TECRO arrange for Representative Roskam to watch his daughter teach

- Subject to the Nondisclosure Provisions of H. Res. 895 of the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress as Amended class and have dinner with his daughter's host family in Taiwan. 69 Mr. Yang responded that TECRO could make arrangements for both requests. 70
- 65. On September 27, 2011, the Executive Assistant emailed Mr. Yang concerning "[a] couple more things for the trip," including a request from Representative Roskam that his daughter join him for some of his meetings in Taipei. 71 When Mr. Yang suggested that "[t]he host may be able to cover her cost as well,"<sup>72</sup> the Executive Assistant told him that he had "talked to someone in the ethics office this morning and confirmed [Representative Roskam] has to pay the costs associated with her being there. The Congressman is fine with that so no need to inquire on that."<sup>73</sup>
- 66. On October 7, 2011, Mr. Yang emailed the Executive Assistant an updated itinerary and accompanying travel memo. 74 The Executive Assistant did not know who prepared either the itinerary or the memo.<sup>75</sup>
- 67. The October 7, 2011 version of the itinerary identified the Chinese Culture University as the host of the trip. 76 The accompanying travel memo also identified the Chinese Culture University as the host of the trip.<sup>77</sup>

68. However, according to the itinerary, the role of the University had been shortened to a single meeting to "[c]all on" the president of the University. 78

- 69. The Taiwan government had a significant role during Representative Roskam's trip. Just prior to the trip, Mr. Yang emailed the Executive Assistant to let him know that Frank Lee, Director of TECRO's Congressional Liaison Division, would meet Representative Roskam and his wife in Taiwan and escort them in the last few days of their trip. 79
- 70. Mr. Yang also informed the Executive Assistant that his "colleague in Taipei's home office...will meet the Roskams on Sunday evening at the arrival gate in Taiwan airport, and he will escort them for the first two days' program in Taipei while Frank [Lee] will also join them for some official meetings."
- 71. Representative Roskam recalled that Mr. Lee escorted him for some part of his trip. 81 He said that there were "many people" who escorted him during the trip, but he did not recall whether any of them were from the Chinese Culture University. 82
- 72. While in Taiwan, Representative Roskam had a number of meetings with members of the Taiwan government scheduled, including the President of Taiwan, the Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Minister of Economic Affairs, and the Speaker of the Taiwan Parliament.<sup>83</sup> He did not know who set up his meetings in Taiwan.<sup>84</sup>
- 73. Representative Roskam recalled no interaction with the Chinese Culture University prior to his trip, other than receiving an invitation letter from the University president from a TECRO official.<sup>85</sup>
- 74. Representative Roskam's interaction with the Chinese Culture University during his trip was limited to one three-hour visit during which he met with the president of the University, toured the University campus, and toured an art museum on the campus.<sup>86</sup>
- 75. Representative Roskam recalled no other contacts with the University during the trip.87
- 76. When Representative Roskam returned from the trip, he had no further contact with the Chinese Culture University.<sup>88</sup>
- 77. After the trip, on October 25, 2011, the Executive Assistant emailed Mr. Yang, "[W]hen do you think you all will have the final ethics forms done?" Mr. Yang responded, "I will get you the detailed information to fill out the post- travel ethics form." On the post- travel ethics form.

- 78. On November 2, 2011, Representative Roskam's post-travel disclosure forms were filed with the Legislative Resource Center. His Executive Assistant prepared the forms, and Representative Roskam signed them. According to the disclosure forms, the sponsor of the trip paid \$25,652.80 in travel expenses for Representative Roskam and his wife. 400 miles of the trip paid \$25,652.80 in travel expenses for Representative Roskam and his wife.
- 79. As noted above, TECRO declined to provide documentary or testimonial evidence in response to the OCE's Request for Information.
- 80. As noted above, the Chinese Culture University declined to provide documentary or testimonial evidence in response to the OCE's Request for Information.
- 81. While the Chinese Culture University declined to cooperate with the OCE's review, it did provide the OCE with a letter in response to the OCE's Request for Information, in which it stated: "[W]e do regularly sponsor important leaders from the United States to visit Taiwan such as Representative Roskam's trip in 2011, which we believe is in accordance with U.S. House ethics rules related to private sponsorship." "94"
- 82. The University further stated that, "[i]n view of Mr. Roskam's important status as a member of U.S. Congress and the lack of staff of this university stationed in the United States, the program for Representative Roskam's visit to Taiwan was coordinated through the kind assistance of Taiwan's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Taipei Economic and Cultural Representative Office in the United States."
- 83. The Board notes that the majority of the communications between Representative Roskam's staff and TECRO officials during the planning of this trip appear to have occurred by electronic message, a communications medium that would not have been affected by the absence of staff stationed in the United States.
  - 3. Ethics Committee approval of Representative Roskam's trip
- 84. According to the Executive Assistant, on or around September 27, 2011, a staff member from the House Ethics Committee contacted him about a "problem" with the Taiwan trip schedule. 96 The Executive Assistant could not recall what the "problem" was. 97
- 85. The Executive Assistant did not recall what the Ethics Committee staff member asked him, nor did he recall what information he provided to the staff member. 98



- 86. The Executive Assistant did not recall discussing the Chinese Culture University with the Ethics Committee staff member. 99
- 87. The Executive Assistant believes that he did not have the information the Ethics Committee staff member was seeking, so he referred her to Mr. Yang. 100 He told the staff member that Mr. Yang was the person with whom he had been working in planning the Taiwan trip. 101 He then emailed the staff member Mr. Yang's contact information. 102



- 88. The Executive Assistant said he gave Mr. Yang a "heads up" that the Ethics Committee staff member would be calling him. <sup>103</sup> He did not recall any follow-up conversations with Mr. Yang about what the Ethics Committee staff member had wanted. 104
- 89. The Executive Assistant did not believe he had any further conversations with the Ethics Committee staff member after referring her to Mr. Yang. 105
- 90. Representative Roskam told the OCE that he did not remember the circumstances surrounding the question from the Ethics Committee or any conversations with his Executive Assistant about this matter. He said that he had given his Executive Assistant broad authority to work with the Ethics Committee. 107

- 91. Representative Roskam said that his only conversation with the Executive Assistant about the Ethics Committee's review of the trip was when the Executive Assistant informed him that the Ethics Committee had approved the trip. 108
- 92. The Committee on Ethics approved Representative Roskam's trip by letter dated September 30, 2011. 109
- 93. In order to assess Representative Roskam's claim that his trip was properly authorized by the Ethics Committee, the OCE sought additional information regarding the Committee's approval process. At the request of the OCE, Representative Roskam provided a letter authorizing Ethics Committee staff to discuss with the OCE all matters concerning his trip to Taiwan. 110 On April 3, 2013, the OCE contacted the Committee to request additional information regarding the approval process. The OCE was unable to obtain this information and therefore unable to assess Representative Roskam's claim.
- 94. The Board finds that Representative Roskam knew, or should have known, that the government of Taiwan was organizing and conducting his trip to Taiwan. Representative Roskam had no interaction with the Chinese Culture University prior to his trip. 111 His contacts with the University were limited to a single three-hour visit during the trip. 112

  He had no further contact with the University following his trip. 113

  Representative Roskam's Executive Assistant never had any interactions with the University. 114 Rather. Representative Roskam's staff worked closely with TECRO officials on Representative Roskam's travel arrangements and trip itinerary. 115

[B]ased on the Standards Committee's longstanding precedent regarding the responsibilities Members have for the conduct and actions of their staff, the Subcommittee finds that it would not well serve the House as an institution to allow its Members to escape responsibility by delegating authority to their staff to take actions and hide behind their lack of knowledge of the facts surrounding those actions. Members choose their own staff and should expect their staff to provide them with all the information necessary to carry out their responsibilities, as well as to stay within the boundaries established by law, regulations, and standards of conduct. Many times Members act through the actions of their staff and, therefore, should be held liable for those actions in certain circumstances.

- 95. The government of Taiwan could not have paid for Representative Roskam's travel expenses under MECEA because Representative Roskam's spouse traveled with him on the trip to Taiwan. The Chinese Culture University could not have paid for Representative Roskam's travel expenses as a private sponsor of the trip because the University did not organize or conduct Representative Roskam's trip to Taiwan.
- 96. The Board therefore finds that there is substantial reason to believe that Representative Roskam accepted payment of travel expenses for an officially connected trip to Taiwan from an impermissible source, resulting in an impermissible gift, in violation of federal law and House rules.

#### III. CONCLUSION

97. The OCE Board recommends that the Committee on Ethics further review the allegation, as there is substantial reason to believe that Representative Roskam accepted payment of travel expenses for an officially connected trip to Taiwan from an impermissible source, resulting in an impermissible gift, in violation of federal law and House rules.

# IV. INFORMATION THE OCE WAS UNABLE TO OBTAIN AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SUBPOENAS

98. The OCE was unable to obtain information from the Chinese Culture University or the Taipei Economic and Cultural Representative Office in the United States. Neither entity provided documents to the OCE in response to Requests for Information, and neither agreed to interviews by OCE staff.

Dear Colleague:

Pursuant to House Rule 25, clause 5(d)(2), the Committee on Ethics hereby approves your and your spouse's proposed trip to Taipei, Taiwan, scheduled for October 15 to 22, 2011, sponsored by the Chinese Culture University.

You must complete a Member Travel Disclosure Form and file it with the Clerk of the House within 15 days after your return from travel. As part of that filing, you are required to attach a copy of this letter and the Private Sponsor Travel Certification Form, including attachments. You must also report all travel expenses totaling more than \$350 from a single source on Schedule VII of your annual Financial Disclosure Statement.

Because the trip may involve meetings with foreign government representatives, we note that House Members may accept, under the Foreign Gifts and Decorations Act, gifts "of minimal value [currently \$350] tendered as a souvenir or mark of courtesy" by a foreign government. Any tangible gifts valued in excess of \$350 received from a foreign government must, within 60 days of acceptance, be disclosed on a Form for Disclosing Gifts from Foreign Governments and either turned over to the Clerk of the House, or, with the written approval of the Committee, retained for official use.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: The OCE requested an interview with the witness and he consented to an interview. The witness made the following statements in response to our questioning:

- 1. The witness was given an 18 U.S.C. § 1001 warning and consented to an interview. The witness signed a written acknowledgement of the warning, which will be placed in the case file in this review.
- 2. The witness is currently the U.S. Representative from Illinois' Sixth Congressional District.
- 3. The witness said that he was generally familiar with the Taipei Economic and Cultural Representative Office in the United States ("TECRO"). He said that, as a Member of Congress, he often interacts with various embassies, and TECRO has the function of an embassy.
- 4. The witness had interactions with TECRO on two occasions prior to the planning of his October 2011 trip. Both occasions involved getting visas for his daughter to travel to Taiwan. The witness did not recall any other interactions with TECRO prior to his trip to Taiwan.
- 5. The witness did not have any have any interaction with the Chinese Cultural University prior to his visit to Taiwan, other than the paperwork related to the trip.
- 6. The witness' staff was mostly involved in planning his trip to Taiwan specifically, Mike Dankler. Other staff members could have been involved, but the primary person who came to the witness' mind was Mr. Dankler.
- 7. The witness recalled general discussions about visiting Taiwan since he came to Congress, but could not remember when or with whom he had the discussions. He commented that almost every Member of Congress goes to Taiwan at some point.
- 8. The witness did not remember when the idea for this particular trip first arose.

- 9. The witness did not remember when he first learned about the invitation to travel to Taiwan, or the first time he had a discussion about the proposed trip.
- 10. The witness said that the "pattern" would have been that Mr. Dankler, as his congressional scheduler, would have been approached about a potential trip.
- 11. The witness did not remember any specific conversation with Mr. Dankler about the trip. The witness only remembered generally discussing travel to Taiwan.
- 12. The witness was asked if recalled what was discussed as the purpose of the trip. The witness stated that it was to learn more about the U.S./Taiwan relationship.
- 13. The witness was asked who the sponsor of the proposed trip was. The witness replied that he "has come to understand that there were two proposed sponsors," whom he identified as the Taiwan government or the Chinese Culture University. The witness said that he did not recall any specific conversations about the distinction between the two potential sponsors or how he learned about the two potential sponsors.
- 14. The witness stated that he understands the actual sponsor to have been the Chinese Culture University, but he did not remember if that was part of his initial conversation with Mr. Dankler.
- 15. The witness recalled receiving a proposed itinerary from Mr. Dankler. He did not know where Mr. Dankler got the itinerary.
- 16. The witness recalled some general discussion of the itinerary mostly about the timing of his travel. The witness also recalled expressing interest in seeing his daughter who was teaching in Taiwan at the time. He did not recall any discussions about specific meetings,
- 17. The witness did not travel with any other Members of Congress or any congressional staff. The witness did travel with his wife, but did not remember when that was decided.
- 18. The witness was asked about his recollection as to whether the trip was originally planned under the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act ("MECEA"). The witness stated that he was generally familiar with MECEA, but that he did not remember any conversation about the proposed trip to Taiwan being a MECEA trip.
- 19. The witness did not remember any discussion about a private sponsor paying for the trip. He said that the discussion was that he had received an invitation to travel to Taiwan and this was the proposed itinerary. He did not recall any conversation about whether the trip was planned under MECEA or was to be privately sponsored.
- 20. When asked if there had been any discussions about the rules relating to travel paid for by a foreign government versus a private source, the witness said that there was a general understanding in his office that all travel comes under the scrutiny of the Ethics Committee. Any conversations he may have had would have been about checking with the Ethics Committee.
- 21. The witness said that he had a "high level of confidence" that his office regularly checked with the Ethics Committee about the planning for this trip.

- 22. The witness said that he did not have a sense of who was paying for this trip. The witness did not recall if the topic of who was paying was discussed. He said that there was a level of confidence that his office was relying on Ethics Committee approval of the trip.
- 23. The witness said he had a sense that, in planning the trip, his staff was following up with the Ethics Committee and "those submitting the invitation," by whom he meant the Chinese Culture University and the government of Taiwan.
- 24. The witness was asked about a June 9, 2011 email from Mr. Dankler to Gordon Yang, a TECRO official, in which Mr. Dankler provided Mr. Yang with information about the witness' daughter, who was to begin teaching English in Taiwan. The witness did not know what prompted the email, but he had expressed an interest in seeing his daughter while he was in Taiwan.
- 25. The witness was able to visit his daughter while on the trip, watched her teach a class, and met her host family over dinner.
- 26. The witness said that another daughter was serving as a high-school volunteer intern at TECRO, for approximately three weeks, at the time his trip was being planned in the summer of 2011.
- 27. The witness did not recall attending a pre-trip briefing at TECRO. He said that he did not recall any meetings regarding this trip.
- 28. The witness did recall having lunch with the ambassador from Taiwan, but did not remember if it was before or after the trip. The witness did not remember any specifics about the lunch.
- 29. The witness also recalled attending a reception at the Taiwanese ambassador's residence some time since he has been in Congress, but he did not remember the date of the event.
- 30. The witness was asked about an August 22, 2011 email exchange between Mr. Dankler and Mr. Yang about extending the witness' trip to Taiwan by one day. The witness did not recall what prompted the change in travel dates.
- 31. The witness said he had no interaction with the Chinese Culture University prior to receiving a letter of invitation from the University that was submitted to the Ethics Committee.
- 32. The witness was asked about a September 27, 2011 email from Mr. Dankler to a staff member at the House Ethics Committee, providing contact information for TECRO official Gordon Yang. The witness explained that he is now familiar with that email, but he did not remember the circumstances surrounding the email with specificity. The witness explained that he had given Mr. Dankler broad authority to check with the Ethics Committee regarding the Taiwan trip.
- 33. The witness did not recall any conversations with Mr. Dankler about this email. The substance of any conversations with Mr. Dankler about his interactions with the Ethics Committee is that the Ethics Committee has approved the trip.
- 34. The witness was shown a copy of the final itinerary and accompanying travel memo emailed to Mr. Dankler on October 7, 2011. The witness recalled receiving the itinerary but did not recall the memo. He did not know who prepared either document, nor did he recall any conversations about the either document at the time he received them.

- 35. The witness did not remember who met him at the airport when he and his wife arrived in Taiwan. He did not remember if someone from the government of Taiwan was there. He did not remember if someone from the Chinese Cultural University was there.
- 36. The witness recalled that Frank Lee, who was the congressional affairs point of contact at TECRO, escorted him for some part of his trip in Taiwan. He said that there were "many people" who escorted him during the trip. He did not know if any of them were from the Chinese Cultural University.
- 37. The witness did not know who set up his meetings in Taiwan. He did not know if any Chinese Culture University officials were present at any of his meetings in Taiwan.
- 38. The witness' only interaction with the Chinese Culture University during this trip was a visit to the University, where he met with the president of the school, toured the campus, and toured a Chinese art museum on campus. His visit lasted approximately three hours.
- 39. When the witness returned from the trip, he had no further contact with the Chinese Culture University. The witness did not recall if he had any further contact with TECRO.
- 40. The witness was shown the pre- and post-travel disclosure forms he filed with the Committee on Ethics for this trip to Taiwan. The witness said that Mr. Dankler was responsible for assembling the filings. The witness signed them.
- 41. The witness was asked who prepared the Private Sponsor Travel Certification Form. The witness stated that the form speaks for itself and that the Chinese Cultural University prepared it. The witness did not discuss the form with anyone.
- 42. The witness did not have any discussions with anyone about who was paying for the trip. There were no discussions about TECRO pre-paying trip expenses and then being reimbursed by the Chinese Cultural University.

This memorandum was prepared on April 22, 2013 after the interview was conducted on April 18, 2013. I certify that this memorandum contains all pertinent matter discussed with the witness on April 18, 2013.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: The OCE requested an interview with the witness and he consented to an interview. The witness made the following statements in response to our questioning:

- 1. The witness was given an 18 U.S.C. § 1001 warning and consented to an interview. The witness signed a written acknowledgement of the warning, which will be placed in the case file in this review.
- 2. The witness has been employed as a Legislative Assistant in the office of Rep. Peter Roskam since October 2012. Prior to this position, he served as the Executive Assistant to Rep. Roskam from approximately January 2009 to October 2012, and as a Staff Assistant from approximately May 2008 to January 2009.
- 3. In his position as Legislative Assistant, and in his prior position as Executive Assistant, the witness reports to the Deputy Chief of Staff. As a Legislative Assistant, the witness typically interacts with Rep. Roskam once per day. When he was Executive Assistant, he had more interactions with Rep. Roskam, by email, text, and telephone.
- 4. As Legislative Assistant, the witness is responsible for the issue areas of trade, foreign affairs, and financial services. He monitors legislative developments, reviews letters, and staffs meetings in these issue areas.
- 5. As Executive Assistant, the witness handled requests for time with Rep. Roskam, scheduled meetings, and made sure that meetings were appropriately staffed. He was also responsible for the issue areas of foreign affairs, financial services, and government reform and oversight.
- 6. The witness stated that he first interacted with the Taiwan Economic and Cultural Representative's Office in the United States ("TECRO") in early to mid-2009. His first interactions dealt with scheduling matters. He has had interactions with TECRO officials on other issues prior to discussing Rep. Roskam's trip to Taiwan.

- 7. The witness has interacted with TECRO officials Frank Lee, Gordon Yang, Livia Sun, and an official named Hans, whose last name he could not recall.
- 8. The witness has had no interactions with anyone from the Chinese Culture University.
- 9. The witness reported having a "fair amount" of interaction with Rep. Roskam during the planning of his October 2011 trip to Taiwan. The interactions dealt mostly with finding dates on which to travel and on keeping him posted regarding the itinerary for the trip. The witness said he had no interactions with Rep. Roskam's family members regarding the trip to Taiwan.
- 10. The witness said that he was the only staff member who worked on the Taiwan trip.
- 11. The witness stated that Rep. Roskam had been invited to travel to Taiwan by TFCRO officials numerous times in the past. The idea for the trip to Taiwan ultimately taken by Rep. Roskam in October 2011 came from TECRO officials in May 2011.
- 12. The witness received a May 13, 2011 email from TECRO official Gordon Yang, inviting Rep. Roskam and other Members of Congress "to join the congressional delegation to visit Taiwan" in June or July 2011. The witness said that this was the first time he heard of the idea for this trip.
- 13. The witness said that he first contacted Mr. Yang about the invitation on June 2, 2011. He could not recall whother they met in person or spoke by telephone.
- 14. The witness did not recall whether he had spoken with Rep. Roskam about the invitation prior to the June 2, 2011 conversation with Mr. Yang, but it was likely he would have.
- 15. The witness said that Mr. Yang asked if Rep. Roskam could help get other Members of Congress to join the Taiwan trip. The witness forwarded the proposed itinerary to a few other schedulers that Rep. Roskam wanted him to focus on, but ultimately no other Members could make the trip.
- 16. The witness said that, based on Mr. Yang's initial invitation email, he understood that the proposed trip to Taiwan would be organized pursuant to the Mutual Education and Cultural Exchange Act ("MECEA").
- 17. The witness stated that, in his initial conversations with Rep. Roskam about the proposed trip, Rep. Roskam indicated that he wanted to take his wife with him on the trip. According to the witness, this request prompted him to have a conversation with Mr. Yang about the trip. He could not recall when this conversation occurred.
- 18. The witness said that as a result of this conversation with Mr. Yang, it was decided that the proposed trip would be privately sponsored, rather than a MECEA trip. The witness did not recall discussing who the private sponsor of the trip would be during this conversation.
- 19. The witness said that he first learned that the Chinese Culture University would be the private sponsor of Rep. Roskam's trip when he read that in the first itinerary sent to him by Mr. Yang.
- 20. The witness said he was not familiar with the Chinese Culture University. He did not have any conversations with Mr. Yang about who the Chinese Culture University was.

- 21. The witness stated that he accepted the invitation to travel to Taiwan, on behalf of Rep. Roskam, on June 7, 2011. At this time, he understood that Rep. Roskam and his wife would be traveling, and that the trip would be privately sponsored.
- 22. The witness believes he would have had a conversation with Mr. Yang about the need for a private sponsor, but he did not recall if he knew who the private sponsor was at this time.
- 23. The witness said that he first received an itinerary for the trip on June 7, 2011 from Mr. Yang.
- 24. The witness was asked about an email from Mr. Yang to him on June 7, 2011, in which Mr. Yang states, "I will work with Taipei and get all the paperwork for you asap...." The witness said he did not know to whom "Taipei" referred, and did not recall focusing on that reference.
- 25. The witness did not know who prepared the trip itinerary.
- 26. The witness recalled a pre-trip briefing lunch held at the TECRO offices in Washington, with the TECRO ambassador and other TECRO officials. Rep. Roskam, his wife, and his youngest daughter, who was interning at TECRO at or around this time, were in attendance, as was the witness. He described the briefing as providing information in a question-and-answer format.
- 27. The witness said he knew at the time of the pre-trip briefing that the Chinese Culture University was the private sponsor of the Taiwan trip, but he does not know if the University was involved in the pre-trip briefing.
- 28. The witness was shown a June 9, 2011 email he sent to Mr. Yang, in which he provides information about Representative Roskam's daughter, who would be teaching English in Taiwan at the time that Rep. Roskam and his wife were to be in that country. The witness said that the daughter's work in Taiwan came up during a conversation with Mr. Yang.
- 29. The witness was shown a June 15, 2011 email from Mr. Yang to the witness, in which Mr. Yang says, "I will bring to you the invitation and the private sponsor certification form signed by the Chinese Culture University...." The witness did not recall receiving the invitation from the University in June 2011.
- 30. The witness said that, at this time, he understood that the University was the private sponsor of the trip, but neither he nor anyone in his office had had any contact with the University.
- 31. The witness said he did not discuss the private sponsor certification form with anyone from the Chinese Culture University.
- 32. The witness said he did not discuss scheduling with the Chinese Culture University.
- 33. When asked about a July 28, 2011 email from Mr. Yang to the witness about booking flights for Rep. and Mrs. Roskam, the witness said that Mr. Yang was the only person he spoke with regarding the logistics for the Taiwan trip.
- 34. When asked about an August 22, 2011 email from Mr. Yang to the witness, in which Mr. Yang writes, "I'm now in Taiwan and have told our guys here about the change of dates...," the witness said he did not know to whom Mr. Yang was referring when he spoke of "our guys."

- 35. The witness said that, on or around September 15, 2011, Rep. Roskam asked him to get in contact with the people organizing his Taiwan trip and arrange time for him to visit his daughter while she was teaching and to arrange dinner with her host family. The witness said that this was ultimately arranged.
- 36. When asked about the September 15, 2011 email from Mr. Yang to the witness regarding changes to the trip itinerary to allow Rep. Roskam to visit his daughter, the witness said that he only worked with Mr. Yang on scheduling issues. He was not sure with whom Mr. Yang may have worked.
- 37. The witness did not recall Mr. Yang mentioning any conversations with anyone from the Chinese Culture University. He did not recall receiving any feedback from the University regarding the itinerary.
- 38. The witness was asked about a September 27, 2011 email from the witness to a counsel at the House Committee on Ethics, in which the witness provides the name and contact information for Mr. Yang. The witness said that the Ethics Committee staff member had contacted him about a "problem" with the schedule. The witness could not recall what the "problem" was, nor did he recall what the Ethics Committee staff member asked him.
- 39. The witness did not recall what he told the Ethics Committee staff member about the trip. He did not recall the Chinese Culture University coming up in the conversation.
- 40. The witness said that he informed the Ethics Committee staff member that Mr. Yang was the person he "had been going through" in planning the trip. He said that he would not have had the information the staff member was seeking, so he would have referred her to Mr. Yang.
- 41. The witness stated that he contacted Mr. Yang to give him a "heads up" that the Ethics Committee staff member would be contacting him.
- 42. The witness did not recall any follow-up conversation with Mr. Yang about the conversation Mr. Yang may have had with the Ethics Committee staff member.
- 43. The witness does not believe he followed-up with the Ethics Committee staff member after providing her with Mr. Yang's contact information.
- 44. The witness was asked about an October 7, 2011 email from Mr. Yang to the witness, in which Mr. Yang provided an updated itinerary and travel memo. The witness said he does not know who prepared either item. The witness said he did not discuss the role of the Chinese Culture University outlined in the updated itinerary.
- 45. The witness did not recall being provided with contact information for anyone at the Chinese Culture University, other than the information included in the private sponsor certification form filed with the Committee on Ethics.
- 46. The witness does not know who greeted the Roskams at the airport in Taiwan or who escorted them on their trip. He said that he does not know if anyone from the Chinese Culture University greeted the Roskams at the airport or accompanied them on the trip.

- 47. The witness did not recall sending any thank you letters after the trip.
- 48. The witness said that he was responsible for assembling and filing the pre- and post-travel filing with the Committee on Ethics. He is not sure who prepared the private sponsor certification form. He has had no contact with the University official who signed the form. He did not take any actions to confirm the information included in the form.
- 49. The witness said he does not know who prepared the itinerary included with the Ethics Committee travel filings. He received it from Mr. Yang.
- 50. The witness said that he understood, from the ethics forms and the trip itinerary, that the Chinese Culture University would be paying for Rep. Roskam's trip to Taiwan.

#### Welcome aboard!

The Chinese Culture University of the Republic of China (Taiwan) hosts your trip, which has been approved by the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on the Standards of Official Conduct.

#### A. Preparation for the trip

1. Air Passage:

a. You will fly from Los Angeles to Taipei through: CI 005, 3:15 pm, Saturday, October 15 from LAX; Arrive TPE at 8:10 pm, Sunday, October 16, 2011

Fly from Taipei back to Los Angeles through: CI 006, 4:40 pm, Saturday, October 22 from TPE; Arrive LAX at 2:05 pm, Saturday, October 22, 2011

b. Please <u>double-check your name on your flight tickets</u> and make sure it is identical to that on your passport.

c. When you check in with U.S. domestic flights, please check in your baggage to final destination Taipei (TPE).

d. Please <u>put a nametag on each piece of your baggage</u>, and write the hotel's name, address and telephone number (the details of the hotel in Taipei are provided in the itinerary). It will be easier for the host's staff to pick them up at the Taiwan's International Airport when you arrive in Taipei and convenient for hotel porter to deliver them to your room.

e. You need to check in by yourself with China Airlines at LAX 2 hours before the departure. The check-in counter of China Airlines is located in the Tom Bradley International Terminal of LAX. After check-in, you can proceed to China Airlines' VIP Lounge before boarding.

- a. You are advised to dress business attire for most of the meetings during the trip. It is suggested to pack up at least one business suit for men and two or three business dress for female members.

4, Your host will cover the bills of hotel room, transportation, and meals during the trip, but will not cover the following:

a. Alcoholic beverage;

- b. International phone calls (The hotel will charge you around NT\$100 as service fee even if you use pre-paid phone cards to make international calls from your room's telephone; you may purchase phone cards from the hotel or convenience stores and make international phone calls with pay phone in the hotel);
- c. Telegrams;
- d. Facsimile;
- e. Internet;
- f. Pay-per-view movies;
- g. Personal services such as massage, sauna and hairdo;
- h. Group activities (except dinners) in the leisure hours, etc.
- 5. The sponsor will cover reasonable laundry fee for you during the trip. (For examples, one suite for the whole trip, one shirt or other necessary items each day.)
- 6. The sponsor will provide transportation for group activities, but that of personal activities will be on your own.

7.<u>Tips:</u>

- a. The 10% gratuity of dining or other services in Taiwan is automatically added to the bills.
- b. However, it's also customary to tip housekeeping, room service, or other services you get from the hotel, and you are responsible for taking care of such tips. (If you put the tips on the bill for services, the hotel will ask you to pay the tips as incidentals when you check out.)

c. It is suggested that the group as a whole tip the limo/bus drivers when they have completed their services in a satisfactory manner.

#### C. General information about Taiwan

#### 1. Weather:

In the Fall, the weather is pleasant. The temperature is about <u>75-85°F</u> in <u>Taipei</u>. The out-of-Taipei tour will be the central part of Taiwan, where the temperature is about <u>75-85°F</u>.

#### 2. Time difference:

All parts of Taiwan are in one time zone, which is 12 hours ahead of Eastern Time in the US while you're traveling there.

#### 3. Electricity:

All the power outlets and voltage in Taiwan follow the same standards as in the U.S. You don't have to bring the adaptors.

4. Shopping, eating, and tipping:

- a. Major credit cards are accepted in almost every store in Taiwan. However, you may still need to bring some cash to exchange for the local currency for shopping. 500 U.S. dollars or less should be enough.
- b. The unit of Taiwan's currency is the New Taiwan Dollar (NT\$). The exchange rate now is about <u>US\$1=NT\$30</u>, U.S. dollars may be exchanged at hotels and banks. You can also withdraw Taiwan dollars from local ATMs with your credit cards while some processing service fees will be charged.

#### 5. Language:

The official language in Taiwan is <u>Mandarin</u>. However, there are two dialects used in Taiwan, namely <u>Taiwanese</u> and <u>Hakka</u>. The following are some useful words in Mandarin.

Chinese Culture University, a private university founded in 1962 here in Taipei, has focused on the education programs with the combination of the essence of Chinese tradition like literature, history, and philosophy and the merits of modern western civilization such as science and democracy.
