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With respect to all the conversations, all of the tapes that have been played to you, of course, and any others that will be played to you, if you need to have any of those replayed to you during your deliberations, of course, that can be arranged.

Sometimes it's easier to follow with your ear if you watch the transcript. Even though there are obvious differences, and I am sure you have noticed those.

This one you are only going to get your ear. We will get the transcript later so you will have it available.

You may find ultimately you want to come back and hear it with the transcript in front of you. If you feel that will be necessary when the time comes you make the request to do it.

The one thing I want to explain to you,

you will get the transcript and later you will have an opportunity to compare the tape with the transcript if you think it is significant.

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The only thing is that we are dealing here with an entirely different matter than things that involve the defendant Myers, the defendant Johanson, I don't know whether the defendant Criden is in any --

MR. BEN-VENISTE: Not at all, your Honor.

THE COURT: So, this is conversation with others but including Mr. Weinberg, is Errichetti. As to the significance of these conversations, there of course is always argument among counsel how significant anything is in a lawsuit. PUCCIO: (Continued) 7 THE COURT: Good afternoon, ladies and gentle-6 men. My apologies for the delay in getting started 9 today. I think we are ready to proceed. ħħ Before we do, however, I want to inquire of 11 you again since I last inquired of you yesterday, has anyone attempted to speak to you or has anyone 12 13 spoken to you about the case? If so, raise your hand. Has any one of you talked to anyone else about 15 the case? Have you seen any television broadcast 16 about the case or newspaper articles about it, 17, magazine articles, or heard any radio broadcasts 18 about it since yesterday? 19 Very good. You may proceed, Mr. Puccio. 20 MR, PUCCIO: Thank you. THE CLERK: Mr. Weinberg, please be advised you 21 22 are still under oath. THE WITNESS: Yes. 23 24 Now, Mr. Weinberg, I believe you testified 25 yesterday that on the 28th of June you had a meeting with

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Mayor Errichetti and another individual; is that right?

- That's correct.
- And do you recall that that was at the Marriott Inn in Virginia?
  - That's correct.
- o Who was the other individual at that meeting, sir?
  - A Senator Williams.

Williams before that day?

That's correct.

- Is that Senator Harrison Williams of New Jersey
- Had you met with Mr. Errichetti and Senator
- MR. BEN-VENISTE: Would your Honor be kind enough to give the jury a limiting instruction with respect to Mr. Criden?

THE COURT: This is -- with respect to Mr. Criden or along the lines that I discussed at side bar.

MR. BEN-VENISTE: I only speak with respect to Mr. Criden, but I think it would apply to all of the defendants.

THE COURT: I will give a double limiting instruction, ladies and gentlemen. First off, the meeting they are talking about, you may recall from the testimony yesterday, involved three people,

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23 24 Weinberg. None of the other three defendants were present, And therefore until I tell you otherwise -unless I tell you otherwise -- you should not weigh the evidence as against them, the other three defend-

ants or any of them.

But there is another sense in which the evidence that you are about to hear should be limited in your consideration. The purpose for which I am admitting this evidence is for you to weigh in connection with the contention that what happened as between the defendant Myers and the sheik's representatives on the occasion which you have seen in one of the videotapes when money was allegedly given to Mr. Myers, what happened on that occasion is something that you are going to have to determine. What the meaning of what happened -- what the witness testified to about it, the defendants have argued to you in their opening statements and apart from questions that this is not what it appears to be on the surface, but was in effect someone acting out something they were supposed to be doing or were told to do.

This evidence that you heard yesterday was

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offered -- admitted for the purpose of your determining whether or not there is merit to the contention that this was in effect a stage play, that the people who were dealing with the sheik -- sheik's representatives -- in our case, that would be Congressman Meyers -- was he acting or was he not? And the contention with respect to the evidence relating to Senator Williams is there was similar conduct on the part of Mr. Weinberg, that he was giving instructions as to exactly what should be said. He did it on the one occasion. Therefore, the argument would be that he -- that is what he did with respect to Congressman Myers. It is what we call similar act kind of testimony. Its significance for your purpose is to determine whether or not there was some kind of a plan, pattern, action carried on by Mr. Myers and/ or the PBI agents to put words into the mouths of the participants so it would appear on television or on tape recordings that they were taking money in return for being influenced in official actions when in fact that was not the case. That is one of the central issues that you are going to have to determine. And this evidence relating to Senator Williams is an entirely different transaction.

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It does not involved any of the -- directly any of the issues that you have to determine in this case. But it is offered solely on this question of what was it that was really going on. I am sorry. It is offered solely on the question of was there some kind of a pattern or plan of action on the part of Mr. Weinberg and Mr. Amoroso to tell people what they were to say.

It is contended that what happened before

Senator Williams is that he was told what to say.

And it is argued that it was part of a plan, and that
plan extended to include what happened before

Congressman Myers. There's no contention that

there is any direct connection between Senator

Williams and Congressman Myers. There is no indication of connections other than the possible common
connection of the defendant-Errichetti having been
present on both occasions.

So it is in that limited sense that you are to view this evidence together with the limitation that it does not apply at this stage directly to any of the other defendants except to the defendant Errichetti.

Mr. Duffy?

 MR. DUFFY: Your Honor, I am sure it was unintentional, but there was a point— the precise
wording of which I now forget, but where your Honor
said Myers, when you meant to say Weinberg. You
instructed the jury that the question was whether
Nyers and the agents and/or the agent said something
to effect a certain rule. I am sure you meant to
say "Weinberg."

THE COURT: I am sure you must have understood me. It is the claim that the common plan of Mr.

Weinberg and the agents that the defendants offer the testimony of the tapes which you heard yesterday, and, as I understand it, what Mr. Puccio wishes to do is to explain a little more of what happened in connection with the Senator Williams matter so that you can better assess whether there was a plan of that nature or whether it was a different kind of transaction which would be viewed differently.

All of these things will be argued to you in the summation and I will have more to say about it in the charge.

Proceed, Mr. Puccio.

check it out. The FBI made an investigation in

West Palm and up here for the missing tapes.

Furst, Esq., please be advised that National Airlines, Inc. ("National") does not have a copy of a ticket issued to Melvin Weinberg for Flight 181 from Florida to New York (LaGuardia) on January 23, 1980 or for any other National flight from Florida to New York on that date

"Please note that National did not have a Flight
181 to New York on that date. However, National's
passenger name record (PNR) does indicate that an
'M.Weinberg' purchased a ticket on January 22, 1980
from Sergeant Travel Agency, a Florida travel agent,
for National's January 23, 1980 Flight 180. Since
the ticket was not issued on National ticket stock,
National does not have a copy of it and therefore
cannot verify that Melvin Weinberg was a passenger.

"In addition, National does not have any record of a baggage claim for loss or damage to any of Melvin Weinberg's property for a flight from Florida to New York."
